# Celebrate Earth Day

We'll be celebrating Earth Day on April 20 at the Center. As of now, the schedule is to plant some seeds and bring in recycling materials to take to the Recycle Station in Newburgh. If you currently do not recycle newspaper, cardboard, all cans and #1 and #2 plastics, start collecting these now to bring April 22.

Recycling is one thing we all **can** do and we all **should** do.

Aluminum was first discovered in the 1820s and is one of the most abundant metals available on earth. Aluminum is a highly sustainable metal. About two-thirds of all aluminum produced ever is still in use.

Save your cans. If you have aluminum cans, and you currently do not recycle them, there are several organizations that will take them.

Ninety-two percent of production energy can be saved by using aluminum scrap instead of virgin materials in the making of different aluminum products. Recycling just one aluminum can saves sufficient energy to run a 100 watt light bulb for about 20 hours, a TV set for around 2 hours and a computer for about 3 hours.

The scrap aluminum thrown away every month in the USA is enough to rebuild the entire U.S. air fleet.

Approximately 61 billion aluminum

cans were recycled and reused in the U.S. in 2011. This number accounts for 65.1 percent of scrap aluminum cans generated in our country that year.

Recycling aluminum cans saved approximately 17 million barrels of gasoline which is adequate to fuel over 1 million automobiles on road for nearly a year.

We can all recycle paper and cardboard, too. In the USA, currently more paper products are recycled than are sent to landfills.

The U.S. paper industry set a goal of a 60 percent recovery rate for scrap paper by 2012. It achieved this goal three years early, measuring a 66.8 recovery rate in 2011.

According to the American Forest & Paper Association, the average amount of paper recovered per person living in the USA was 334 pounds per year.

On a daily basis, U.S. papermakers recycle enough paper to fill a 14-mile long train of boxcars.

Paper recycling supports carbon sequestration.

The benefits of recycling one ton of paper include:

- Saving enough energy to power the average American home for six months.

- Avoiding use of 7,000 gallons of water.
- Avoiding the use of 3.3 cubic yards of landfill space.
- Avoiding greenhouse gas emissions by one metric ton of carbon equivalent (MTCE).

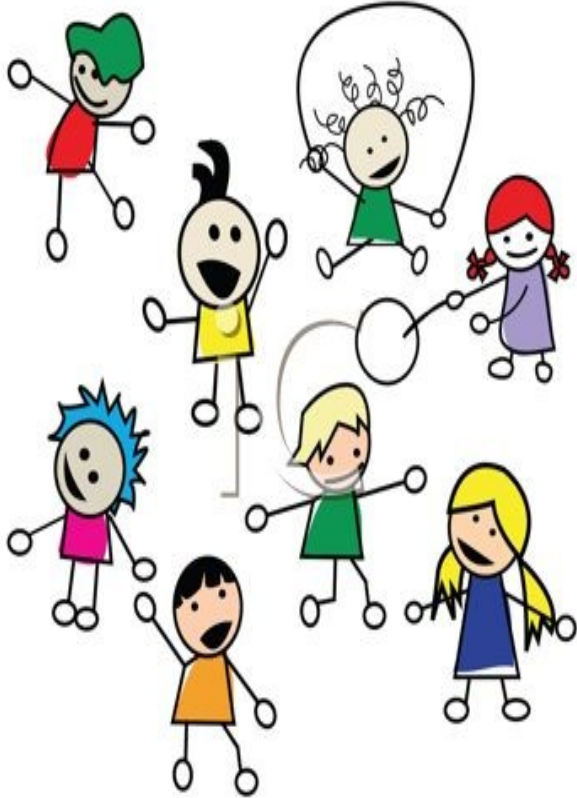
